Christ is in our Midst! *He is and ever shall be!*

Welcome to St. George! Thank you for attending today's Divine Services. If you are a first-time visitor, please register your visit by completing the guest book located in the narthex. We would appreciate getting to meet you after liturgy, so feel free to join us during Coffee Fellowship! Every Sunday we remember the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. The word *"Liturgy"* means *work of the people* that means everyone participates through singing, praying, hearing the teaching, and opening our hearts to allow God's grace to enter. Anyone interested in learning more about our faith are encouraged to speak with one of our clergy.

Guidelines for Receiving Holy Communion for Orthodox Christians: Orthodox Christians fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist by receiving Holy Communion in fulfillment of Christ's command *to eat His Body and drink His Blood*. In order to be properly prepared to receive Holy Communion, the faithful should fast (no food or drink from midnight the night before), the Sacrament of Confession (7 years and older) within the last 2 months, being at peace with others, and striving to always love God and their neighbor. Frequent communion and regular confession are recommended for all faithful Orthodox Christians.

For other Christians: We welcome you to this celebration of the Divine Liturgy. Unfortunately, we cannot extend to you a general invitation to receive Holy Communion. Orthodox Christians believe that the Eucharist is an action of the celebrating community signifying a oneness in faith, life, and worship of our community. Reception of the Eucharist by Christians not fully united with us would imply a oneness which does not yet exist, but for which we must all pray. All, however, are welcome to partake of the blessed bread (*antidoron*) which will be given when coming forward to venerate (kiss) the Holy Cross and receive the final blessing from the priest. Again, welcome!

- GENERAL ASSEMBLY VOTING MEMBER is defined in our Constitution as: all persons, regardless of sex, eighteen (18) years of age and over, who have been baptized and accepted as members of the Holy Orthodox Church according to its teachings, who accept, profess and practice the faith and discipline of the Holy Orthodox Church and who subscribe to the temporal maintenance of the Parish, through payment of such dues, pledges and assessments.
- General Assembly Proxies are given to those who cannot attend the meeting because of medical treatment or illness, those confined to their homes, or those with written verification of a prior travel commitment. A VOTING member who cannot attend the meeting may have another VOTING member vote on their behalf. PLEASE NOTE: Proxies can be picked up in in the church office and must be returned back to the office by THIS Sunday, November 5th. Proxies received after November 5th will be considered invalid. A proxy cannot be replaced.

Orthodox Witness ~ Within the Fold, but Without Love

That our Orthodox Church possesses the Fullness of Truth is a given, yet in our weakness as believers, the obviousness of that Truth is often invisible to others. In our weakness as sinful people, we Orthodox clergy, as well as the laity, often fail to demonstrate the love and joy that would make our faith attractive to others.

When people visit an Orthodox temple for the first time, if all they see is beautiful ritual, and a mystical interior, but are not received warmly by the Orthodox worshipers, they likely will walk away thinking this Faith has no impact on the soul. Beautiful worship and transcendent theology mean nothing if we don't live it out in love for others.

Grand services can be performed on any stage as reenactments of ancient Christian worship, complete with beautiful costumes, and authentic images of an ancient faith. Yet these rites will be nothing but empty externals, devoid of any meaning, if we Orthodox Christians make no effort to breathe in the faith, and allow Christ to change our hearts, and transform us into a holy people.

It is only when we invite God to make us His holy people that the spiritual power of the services, and the beauty of our temples, become irresistible to others, and they, by God's grace, become seekers themselves.

My sons and daughters in our protected parishes, in the Antiochian Orthodox Christian Archdiocese of North America,

"The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the blessing of God the Father, and the communion of the Holy Spirit may be with you all." (2 Corinthians 13:14)

Beloved Faithful,

Following the call of the Holy Synod of Antioch, which beckons all its children to dedicate a Sunday following the Synod's conclusion to collect aid for our brethren at the Patriarchate of Jerusalem, and to partake in the relief of their suffering while demonstrating the Christian communion of humanity in times of affliction, we hereby announce that the upcoming Sunday, falling on November 12, shall be designated as the day for collecting aid throughout our Archdiocese. We kindly request all parishes to send their collections to the Archdiocesan headquarters. The Archdiocese will continue to collect aid for one month starting from November 12th.

In response to some of your questions regarding the inclusion of petitions in the Divine Liturgy for the sake of peace and mercy in the Holy Land, I would like to clarify:

The practice of introducing new petitions into the Divine Liturgy does not depend on a personal decision by a bishop or priest. Following the Holy Tradition of our Orthodox Church, at the end of the Great Entrance while processing with the Holy Gifts, the priest offers the people's supplications and mentions names and regions that are going through turbulent events. This is what we hope for from all of you in these days when humanity is in dire need of divine mercy.

Furthermore, we recommend that the service of the *Paraklesis* (Supplicatory Canon) be held in the churches to the extent possible for the faithful to offer supplications

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Prayer from the Akathist to the Myrrh-streaming Icon of the Mother of God – "Softener of Evil Hearts"
