Welcome to St. George! Thank you for attending today's Divine Services. If you are a first-time visitor, please register your visit by completing the guest book located in the narthex. We would appreciate getting to meet you after liturgy, so feel free to join us during Coffee Fellowship! Every Sunday we remember the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. The word "Liturgy" means work of the people that means everyone participates through singing, praying, hearing the teaching, and opening our hearts to allow God's grace to enter. Anyone interested in learning more about our faith are encouraged to speak with one of our clergy.

Guidelines for Receiving Holy Communion for Orthodox Christians: Orthodox Christians fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist by receiving Holy Communion in fulfillment of Christ's command to eat His Body and drink His Blood. In order to be properly prepared to receive Holy Communion, the faithful should fast (no food or drink from midnight the night before), the Sacrament of Confession (7 years and older) within the last 2 months, being at peace with others, and striving to always love God and their neighbor. Frequent communion and regular confession are recommended for all faithful Orthodox Christians.

For other Christians: We welcome you to this celebration of the Divine Liturgy. Unfortunately, we cannot extend to you a general invitation to receive Holy Communion. Orthodox Christians believe that the Eucharist is an action of the celebrating community signifying a oneness in faith, life, and worship of our community. Reception of the Eucharist by Christians not fully united with us would imply a oneness which does not yet exist, but for which we must all pray. All, however, are welcome to partake of the blessed bread (antidoron) which will be given when coming forward to venerate (kiss) the Holy Cross and receive the final blessing from the priest. Again, welcome!

The Enemy \sim The Enemy of Faith is Pride



The absolute necessary element for salvation is faith. Faith alone will save us, for only faith brings us into communion with God. Faith is a free gift, for nothing we can do can save us. Good works cannot save us. Being a good person will not save us. Only faith in Christ will bring us into everlasting life.

The enemy of faith is pride, for pride destroys faith. Pride makes us believe we do not need God, and pride is what leads many into the abyss of atheism, for pride makes us believe that there is nothing beyond ourselves. Pride leads us to believe that we are all important, and that nothing exists beyond ourselves. Once pride takes hold, our heart grows hard, and faith grows cold and dies.

Repentance is the cure for pride, and only through repentance can we rekindle the grace that brings life to our faith. Humbling ourselves before God, and giving ourselves over to divine worship, brings us back into the natural relationship that was preordained for us before the fall, and faith grows as grace rebounds.

Greetings and blessings to you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

March is Women's Month in our archdiocese, and we welcome it as a reminder of the essential role women play in our churches and archdiocese. Saturday of the Souls

Praying for the reposed is a crucial element of our Orthodox Christian faith. The life of a human being does not end with the dissolution of their earthly body and the separation of their soul from the body, but the person continues alive in spirit awaiting general resurrection. "Do not marvel at this; for the hour is coming in which all who are in the graves will hear His voice and come forth—those who have done good, to the resurrection of life, and those who have done evil, to the resurrection of condemnation." (John 5: 28-29)

Christianity addresses every human being saying: "O man, do not only say that you are from the dust and to the dust you return, but say also that you are from God and to Him you will return."

Soul Saturday:

The Orthodox Church assigns two Saturdays per year as a general memorial to those who have departed in the hope of the glorious resurrection, for some people have no one to commemorate them. It should be noted that every Saturday, according to our Orthodox tradition, is dedicated to the departed except Lazarus Saturday, Holy Saturday, and feast days. Likewise, the departed are commemorated in every Divine Liturgy during the Service of Preparing the Gifts (bread and wine), in the Great Entrance, and after the consecration of the Holy Gifts.

The Saturday just before the Sunday of the Last Judgment or Meat-fare Sunday.

Judgment means the second coming of Christ, and because our dead are not yet subject to judgment, the Church commemorates the reposed in hope, and invites us to pray for the rest of their souls by the infinite mercy of God, also reminding us of the need to repent.

The Saturday immediately before Pentecost.

The Holy Spirit is the source of life, grace and holiness, and hence we solicit the grace of the Holy Spirit for the comfort and rest of the reposed.

Note:

There is no death in Christianity because the truly dead person is the one who rejects the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and his presence in his heart. And here we hear the Apostle Paul say: "Awake, you who sleep, arise from the dead, and Christ will give you light." (Ephesians 5:14)

Summary:

There is no death in Christianity, but rest and a transition to eternal life.

It is the Soul Saturday of the reposed, and not of the dead. Death is killed by the death of Christ on the Cross. When the Lord descended into hades death was defeated.

Therefore, the Creed, which is from the 4th century, does not mention the word "dead" for Christ. Rather, it says of him: "He was crucified during the reign of Pilate Pontius, He suffered, was buried and rose on the third day."

Our departed rest in the hope of eternal resurrection and therefore do not die. The Master and Source of life was incarnate, took our human nature, and was crucified. He arose and resurrected us with him, and death was abolished by His death. We became people of the Resurrection.

The best consolation uttered by Jesus to the sister of Lazarus, who was stinking after four days in the grave is this: "I am the resurrection and the life; he who believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and whoever lives and believes in me shall never die. (John 11:25-26). Then He stood at Lazarus' tomb and cried with a loud voice, saying, "Lazarus, come out!" So he came out.

Christ is Risen! and when we are in Him, we will be risen also!
