THE SAINT WHO WAS SANTA CLAUS

ominating our Christmas, rather "holiday" season, (we do not want to be offensive to our non-Christian and non-believing friends), is the Santa Claus legend. The Santa figure and the gift giving displays find their source not in Jesus Christ as much as in the story by Clement Moore, "The Night Before Christmas." which is itself a distorted derivative of the actual life of the great Orthodox Bishop Nicholas who lived in the small coastal town of Myra in what is today Turkey.

In the Moore poem, a modern family is invaded by a well-meaning old man who leaves gifts nobody seems to have asked for or even want. This is the first distortion of the real situation. May we all live our lives and lack nothing! Yet if we can penetrate the stories told of the actual fourth century bishop, under the layers of legend that cover St. Nicholas throughout the centuries, we find one feature common to each tale, no matter how distorted: Bishop Nicholas always aids those in dire need. Despite the myths surrounding the event, the extreme circumstances of those in the tales of St. Nicholas are much more like the life we know than the family in the Moore story.

We cannot imagine a "right jolly old elf" who has no contact with our lives, who we neither call upon nor need, yet who brings us gifts we could well do without. What purpose does it serve to perpetuate this story in the fantasies of our children?

We can, however, conceive of one who lived among his people, praying with them weekly and for them daily, knowing their lives as well as they. Could he have prayed for them without wanting to come to their aid? Would he not have done whatever was possible, going to any conceivable length to protect or to help those whom he loved? Not only did he "know if they'd been bad or good," because they would have confided in him as bishop, confessor and guide. It was no mystery that he would have known what they lacked, and he did whatever he could to obtain it.

After the age of the Lord's first apostles, who went about the known world preaching of the messiah they had lived with for three years, Jesus of Nazareth; and after the death of even those who could say they had spoken with one of the original apostles, a deep spiritual need was felt throughout the Christian church.

It was not enough to speak of Christ; only for a while could all the baptized Christians be satisfied with the promise of His second coming. Those who called themselves followers of Christ had to show by their living example what it meant to walk in the footsteps of the Savior. How are we to be like Christ in the world? Just what is expected of us here, now, in our world?

This is what Bishop Nicholas is to us; the one who showed how to believe in Christ and yet be in the world of our times. He taught by example the way one follows Christ. This is what is meant by calling those like him "saints."

We will celebrate this Holy Saint at our sister parish!

The Nativity Fast: Why?

By Fr. Stephen Freeman November 15th marked the beginning of the Nativity Fast (40 days before Christmas). The following article offers some thoughts on the purpose of fasting.

Fasting is not very alive and well in the Christian world. Much of that world has long lost any living connection with the historical memory of Christian fasting. Without the guidance of Tradition, many modern Christians either do not fast, or constantly seek to re-invent the practice, sometimes with unintended consequences.

There are other segments of Christendom who have tiny remnants of the traditional Christian fast, but in the face of a modern world have reduced the tradition to relatively trivial acts of self-denial.

I read recently (though I cannot remember where) that the rejection of Hesychasm was the source of all heresy. In less technical terms we can say that knowing God in truth, participating in His life, union with Him through humility, prayer, love of enemy and repentance before all and for everything, is the purpose of the Christian life. Hesychasm (Greek Hesychia=Silence) is the name applied to the Orthodox tradition of ceaseless prayer and inner stillness.

But these are incorrectly understood if they are separated from knowledge of God and participation in His life, union with Him through humility, prayer, love of enemy, and repentance before all and for everything. And it is the same path of inner knowledge of God (with all its components) that is the proper context of fasting. If we fast but do not forgive our enemies – our fasting is of no use. If we fast and do not find it drawing us into humility – our fasting is of no use. If our fasting does not make us yet more keenly aware of the fact that we are sinful before all and responsible to all then it is of no benefit. If our fasting does not unite us with the life of God – which is meek and lowly – then it is again of no benefit.

Fasting is not dieting. Fasting is not about keeping a Christian version of kosher. Fasting is about hunger and humility (which is increased as we allow ourselves to become weak). Fasting is about allowing our heart to break. I have seen greater good accomplished in souls through their failure in the fasting season than in the souls of those who "fasted well." Publicans enter the kingdom of God before Pharisees pretty much every time.

Why do we fast? Perhaps the more germane question is "why do we eat?" Christ quoted Scripture to the evil one and said, "Man does not live by bread alone but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God." We eat as though our life depended on it and it does not. We fast because our life depends on the word of God.

I worked for a couple of years as a hospice chaplain. During that time, daily sitting at the side of the beds of dying patients – I learned a little about how we die. It is a medical fact that many people become "anorexic" before death – that is – they cease to want food. Many times family and even doctors become concerned and force food on a patient who will not survive. Interestingly, it was found that patients who became anorexic had less pain than those who, having become anorexic, were forced to take food. (None of this is about the psychological anorexia that afflicts many of our youth. That is a tragedy)

It is as though at death our bodies have a wisdom we have lacked for most of our lives. It knows that what it needs is not food – but something deeper. The soul seeks and hungers for the living God. The body and its pain become a distraction. And thus in God's mercy the distraction is reduced.

Christianity as a religion – as a theoretical system of explanations regarding heaven and hell, reward and punishment, is simply Christianity that has been distorted from its true form. Either we know the living God or we have nothing. Either we eat His flesh and drink His blood or we have no life in us. The rejection of Hesychasm is the source of all heresy.

Why do we fast? We fast so that we may live like a dying man – and in dying we can be born to eternal life.



FASTING DISCIPLINE FOR DECEMBER On Wednesday, November 15th, we began the traditional forty-day **Nativity Fast** (*also called the Christmas or Advent Fast*) in preparation for the **Nativity of Christ** on December 25th. The Fast is divided into two periods. The <u>first period</u> is until December 19th when the traditional fasting discipline (*no meat, poultry, eggs, dairy, fish, wine, oil and their by-products*) is observed on all days except Tuesdays and Thursdays when *wine and oil* are allowed and Saturdays and Sundays when *fish, wine, and oil* are allowed. The 2nd period is from December 20th through 24th, when the traditional fasting discipline (*no meat, poultry, eggs, dairy, fish, wine, oil and their by-products*) is observed except on Saturday and Sunday when *wine and oil* are permitted. There is no fasting from our Lord's Nativity, December 25th until January 4th.

If people belong to St. George but do not offer annually, they are considered, only for renting our Center, as non-parishioners. NOTHING is to be hung from the walls and ceilings. If available, there is an additional cost to decorate the day before. The rules for renting are the same for everyone.

Holy Sacrament of Repentance (confession) If you are 8 years or older, have been away from the Church, or have not had Confession in the last 2 months and desire to come back and receive Holy Communion, the Body and Blood of Christ, please remember you must offer a confession of your sins first. During this time of preparation during the *Christmas* ~ *the Nativity of our Lord Great Fast* is a perfect opportunity. Confessions are heard after Saturday Great Vespers, between 8:30-9:30am on Sunday, and by appointment. Because it is so important and for your convenience, Fr. Joe and Fr. Michael will hear confessions after Coffee Fellowship Sunday, December 17th. Fr. Joe and Fr. Michael are not the only Orthodox priests in the area, and if you would prefer to go for confession to one of the other local priests, feel free to do so (please just let Fr. Joe know): Fr. Peter Bistorides from Assumption Church (810-771-4611), Fr. Gabriel Bilas from St. Mary Magdalene (810-750-1401) or Fr. Matthew Butrie from St. Nicholas Church (810-744-0070). Let everyone in our St. George Family prepare and partake of our Lord in Holy Communion on His Nativity! The important thing is not who hears your confession, but that you participate in this Holy Sacrament on a regular basis. Blessed are those who wash their (baptismal) robes, that they may have the right to the Tree of Life (which is Jesus Christ). (Revelation 22:14)

The Twelve Days of Christmas

People often think of *The Twelve Days of Christmas* as the days preceding the festival. Actually, Christmas is a season of the Christian Year beginning December 25 and lasting until January 5-the day before Epiphany, our Lord's Baptism. This is when the church celebrates the revelation of Christ as the light of the world.

From 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not allowed to practice their faith openly. During that era someone wrote "*The Twelve Days of Christmas*" as a kind of secret catechism that could be sung in public without risk of persecution. The song has two levels of interpretation — the surface meaning and a hidden meaning known only to members of the church. Each element in the carol is a code word for a religious truth and reality! The "true love" mentioned in the song refers to God Himself and the "me" who receives the presents refers to every baptized person!

The <u>partridge</u> in a pear tree is *Jesus Christ*.

The two turtledoves are the *Old and New Testaments*.

Three French hens stand for faith, hope and love (1 Corinthians 13).

The <u>four calling birds</u> are the *four Gospels* (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John).

The <u>five gold rings</u> recall the *first five books of the Old Testament* (the Torah or Law).

The six geese a-laying stand for the *six days of creation* (Genesis 1).

Seven swans a-swimming represent the sevenfold gifts of the Spirit.

The <u>eight maids a-milking</u> are the *eight beatitudes* (Matthew 6).

Nine ladies dancing are the *nine fruits of the Spirit* (Galatians 5).

The ten lords a-leaping are the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20).

Eleven pipers piping stand for the *eleven faithful disciples*.

Twelve drummers drumming symbolize the 12 points of belief in the Creed.

Stewardship

Beloved in Christ:

<u>Dictionary.com</u> defines "stewardship" as "1. the position and duties of a steward, a person who acts as the surrogate of another or others, especially by managing property, financial affairs, an estate, etc. and 2. the responsible overseeing and protection of something considered worth caring for and preserving." From the very beginning, man was called to be a steward of creation (Genesis 2:15). Imagine that! God had so much love and confidence in humanity that he placed us as stewards of His creation. We are called to act as a stand-in for God managing the planet and all that is part of it.

While the world debates whether we have done this well or not and how we should be taking care of the planet moving forward, I would suggest at least for today that we focus a little closer to home on our stewardship. **God has blessed us with so much!** One of those great blessings is to be stewards of the faith and in particular this parish of St George. This means we bear responsibility for the well-being of the parish and one another. Is not our parish family worth our care and concern - not for the sake of preserving it, but so that we might thrive and find our way to the Kingdom. This happens by all of us being regular communicants and participants in the liturgical life (Divine Services) of the Church. We do not do this because it is an obligation or even a commitment we have made, but rather because we know this is the path to salvation. Through the sacramental life, we receive God's grace. Let us ask ourselves do I want to be saved? Do I want our children to know God and live in His eternal presence? I would hope and pray that we would all say yes to these questions.

So, what does our "Yes!" look like? In addition to our faithful attendance in services, it could be many of us stepping up in our participation in the ministry of the Church and our parish. It might manifest itself in us volunteering as needs arise, not only in the parish but also in the greater communities that we live. It would be rooted in our prayer for us as the parish family of St George and in us individually seeking God's will in all things. In material form, it is our free and willing giving to support the ministry of the Church. The majority of us already do these things. Well done!

The next question is, "What more can I do?" No one can answer that for us. We have to examine that question in a very personal and intimate way so that we may discern what else does God want from me. Keep in mind that God needs nothing from us, but instead that it is what God wants for us. Jesus taught us to be perfect as our heavenly Father is perfect (Matthew 5:48). In this perfection of being God's stand-in, we will not only find our way to eternal life with God, but we will witness to others of God's true love - His creation caring for each other and realizing that we are the center or high point of that creation. The choice is for each of us to make. God trusts us; let us trust Him by being his good and faithful stewards.
